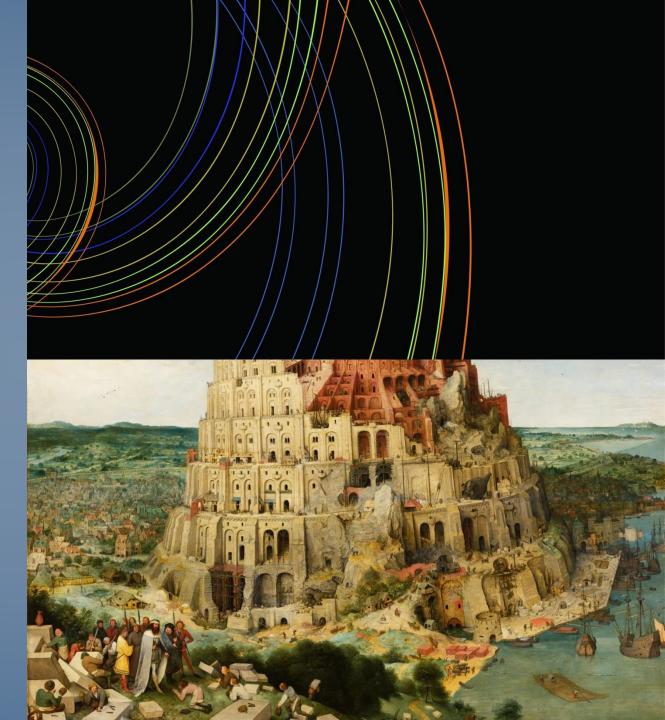

Sons of God and Daughters of Men 6:1-4

Interpretive Option 1

"sons of God" = line of Seth (ch. 5)
"daughters of men"= line of Cain (ch. 4)

Issue: Marriage between the godly and the ungodly

Augustine's City of God

Aquinas:

Hence by the sons of God are to be understood the sons of Seth, who were good; while by the daughters of men, the Scripture designates those who sprang from the race of Cain.

Sons of God and Daughters of Men 6:1-4

Option 2

"sons of God" = human rulers (Exod 22:8-9) rulers forcibly taking women for a harem

Issue: Lust; sexual violence; oppression --Similar issue in Gilgamesh story

Sons of God and Daughters of Men 6:1-4

Option 3

"sons of God" = heavenly beings Cf. Job 1:6; 2:1; 38:7; 29:1 Cf. selected Greek texts "the angels of God"

"And angels who did not keep their own domain, but abandoned their proper abode, He has kept in eternal bonds under darkness for the judgment of the great day"—Jude 6

Prelude to the Flood 6:5

6:5 "The LORD saw that the wickedness of humankind ('adam) was great on the earth ('adamah) and that every inclination of the thoughts of their hearts was only evil continually."

Prelude to the Flood 6:11-13

6:11-13

The earth was <u>corrupt/destroyed</u> (<u>shehat</u>) in the sight of God; the earth was filled with <u>violence</u>.

God saw the earth, and indeed it was <u>corrupt/destroyed</u> for all living creatures had <u>corrupted/destroyed</u> (shehat) their way on the earth.

So, God said to Noah,

"I have decided that all living creatures must die,
for the earth is filled with violence because of them.

Now I am about to corrupt/destroy (shehat) them and the earth."

The Flood: Divine Sorrow and Divine Redemption

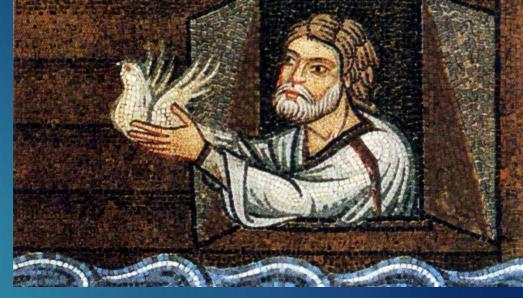
- v. 6 "And YHWH was sorry that he had made humankind upon the earth and his heart was grieved."
- v. 7 "I will blot out (mahah) from the earth the human beings that I have created—people together with animals and creeping things and birds of the air because I regret that made them."

The Flood: Divine Recreation

- Gen. 1- "a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep and a wind from God swept over the face of the waters."
- Gen. 8:1- "and God made a wind blow over the earth and the waters subsided."

- ▶ Gen. 1:28- "be fruitful and multiply"
- Gen. 9:1- "be fruitful and multiply"

But Why Noah?



- NRSV— "I have seen that you alone are righteous before me in this generation."
- NIV— "The LORD then said to Noah, 'Go into the ark, you and your whole family, because I have found you righteous in this generation.'"
- Hebrew—"I have seen you, a righteous person from among this generation."

The Sign of the Bow

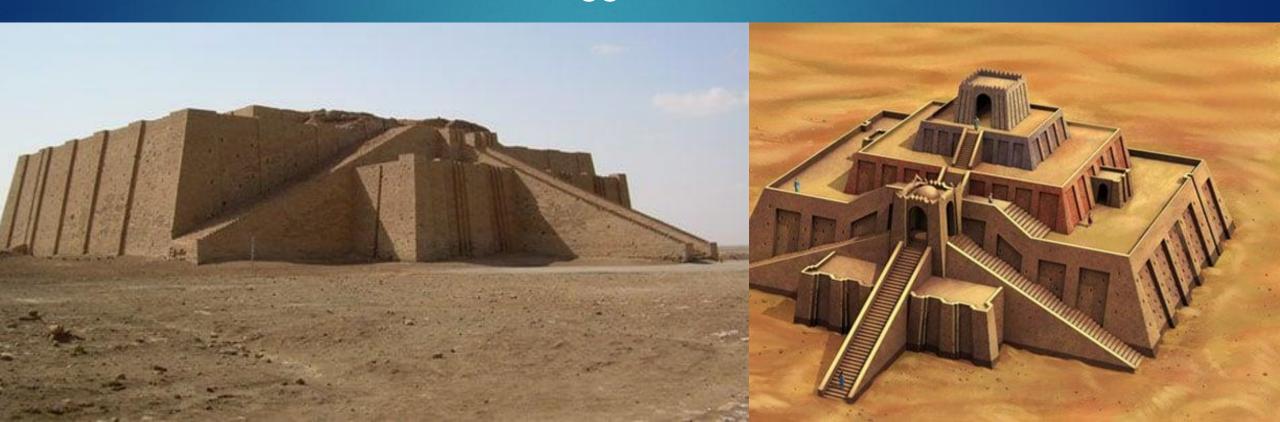
Hebrew word is qešet, "bow", as in a bow and arrow

Tower of Babel: Human Inclinations and Divine Response

v. 3 Let us make bricks (lebenim)	v. 7 Let us confuse (nebelim) their language

v. 4 Lest we be scattered	vv. 8, 9 The LORD scattered them
